Abraham Lincoln Frey (1861-1952)



Abraham Lincoln Frey was born on April 5, 1861, in Lancaster County Pennsylvania. He died on February 29, 1952, at age 90 in Pottstown, Montgomery County Pennsylvania. He is buried at the Mount Tunnel Cemetery in Elizabethtown, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. His wife was Sadie B. Rider-Frey who was born in 1864 and died in 1943. They had a daughter who passed away at the age of one year, six months in 1896 whom they are buried with. They also had two sons, Clayton R Frey (1886-1962) and Paul Rider Frey (1893-1979).¹

After a search of Pennsylvania newspaper archives using different variations of his name very few papers came up. And within that, it is hard to know which one is talking about him. The best source from the newspaper archives that was found was a short excerpt from the Mount Joy Bulletin which speaks of a Mrs. Stauffer who is the daughter of a Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Lincoln Fry from Elizabethtown. This information conflicts with the information found from the Find a Grave website in various capacities. In the Find a Grave source the daughter listed died before the age of two. This newspaper article also claims that Frey was named after the "Great Emancipator because he was born on the day the civil war ended." which once again conflicts with the information listed in Find a Grave. Frey was born in 1861, the civil war ended in 1865.

With a 6-1 victory Tuesday afternoon, May 19, Ephrata's baseball Indians clinched a Section One championship and edged their season's record to 12-1.

Ephrata was the victim. To add strength to the Donagel win, Haverhill Tuesday clinched strong, second-place position. Penn State, 8-1.

The P.A.'s claim the only win of the season over the Tribe, taking a 4-3 decision in a freakish-type ball game last week.

The pennant-effective Tuesday was hosted by Tom Haverhill, who gave only four hits while striking out eight. He gave one walk and went the distance to take his season to 6-2.

The Indians now move into the county playoffs, tentatively set for Tuesday night, May 26, at Ephrata.

Only one regular game remained on the card—a scheduled meeting with Elmabethtown. The game was to have been the last one of the season, back on April 2, but it was postponed because of bad weather.

Full military services for Staff Sgt. Eugene R. Holt, 18, who died in Vietnam on Sunday, May 3, were held Monday, May 11, and burial was made in Kraybill cemetery.

He was taken in a military medical vehicle, where he died the same day.
