We aimed to gather a further understanding of OTP's perspectives of their own assessment of vision in the inpatient setting, the barriers that may impact vision assessment, and if they are consistent with current literature, and what can be done to overcome these barriers and improve vision assessment and patient outcomes. In response, the Adult Congenital Heart Disease - Functional Performance Screening Tool (ACHD-FPST) was created, aiming to enhance the quality of life for ACHD patients by helping practitioners identify potential issues that may require further intervention. 7:20-7:50 Esbenshade 360	Impact of an Interoception-based Intervention for Individuals with Concussion-Related Self-Regulation and Visual Efficiency Challenges Graduate Students: Brian Coletta, Autumn Finke, Cara Jandzio, Emily Polimeni Faculty Mentor: Meghan Chemidlin, OTD, OTR/L Purpose: This study utilized a single-group pretest-posttest design to determine if a six-week interoception-based intervention improves visual efficiency and self-regulation skills in those with a mild traumatic brain injury, specifically a concussion. 7:20-7:50 Esbenshade 382	Mindfulness-Based Intervention: Effects on Emotional Regulation, Behavior, and Social Participation for Preschool Students Graduate Students: Ella Longenecker, Samantha Deiaco, Ellysa Herr, Sarah Lloyd Faculty Mentor: Helen Russell, OTD, OTR/L Purpose: This study examined the effects of the Calm and Alert mindfulness-based intervention on emotional regulation, behavior, and social participation among preschool students. Researchers employed a quasi-experimental pretest-posttest design with a waitlist-control group to assess the intervention's impact on student behavior and self-regulation, using the Head-Toes-Knees-Shoulders (HTKS) task and the Strengths and Difficulties Questionnaire (SDQ) as key measures.
